

Eventually, with his children grown, Gil's excuse to visit the mountain retreat vanished. Finding Home

After months of exploring, the Culbreths stumbled upon Eagle's Nest, a new log home community in Maggie Valley, North Carolina. Set in the heart of the Smoky Mountains, about 35 miles west of Asheville, they staked their claim on two adjacent lots for a combined 3 acres of wooded property. The parcel offered relatively level terrain on its mountainside locale and included a stream that runs across the back of the property. It was the perfect setting for their new home, though they hadn't even thought about building with logs until then.



BLAST FROM THE PAST

hen asked about his favorite feature of the house, home owner Gil Culbreth doesn't hesitate: He loves the bar crafted from the logs of a 250-year-old cabin that builder Scott Campbell dismantled and redesigned as the focal point of the game room. "I told him

to use his imagination, and that's just what he did," says Gil with a laugh. (The mantels built for each of the home's three fireplaces also were crafted from the old logs.)

"It wasn't what we were set on at first," recalls Gil. "But we loved the community. We appreciated the fact that everything was going to be left in its natural state, and we just liked the idea that everything was going to be log homes."

Fitting the Pieces

After buying the land, the couple, who was in no hurry to build, decided to put the area to one final test before beginning construction. Over the course of many months, they rented several homes in the area for a week at a time and got to know the surroundings, people, shops and builders. "We spent a lot of time exploring the area and decided it was perfect for us," Gil remembers. "During our adventures, we admired several homes in the area and eventually learned they were

all by the same builder."

So Gil and Marie tracked down the man behind the homes and found Scott Campbell of J. Scott Campbell Construction, who was a wealth of information about log construction. Based on the style the couple admired, Scott recommended local log provider Top Notch, a division of Pioneer Log Systems based in Kingston Springs, Tennessee.

Working from one of the company's stock plans, the couple teamed up with Scott to customize their 4,800-square-foot home. Boasting three levels of finished living space, the four-bedroom structure boasts abundant glass for a bright and open view of the natural surroundings. And the wraparound, covered porches tack on an additional 2,000 feet of living space close to nature.


The chilly mountain air surrounding the Culbreth's vacation home makes it the perfect escape from scorching Florida summers. But the family also nestles into their retreat—named Mountain Stream—during the winter months. Although they don't ever see themselves retiring to live full-time in the mountains, both Gil and Marie are thrilled to finally have a place to host their children and grandchildren in any season.

"My son and his wife now have children of their own, and I expect that someday they'll go to a camp as well," says Gil. But even if those plans never come to pass, the family's future generations are sure to experience the natural beauty and serenity of Camp Culbreth. 


